Restoration Projects continue around Ellesmere

Once again, planting is under way at Tinaku restoration project sites. Over the month of May, Nova Sylva contractors planted six sites along ESAI member's lowland waterways.

Wai-ora's planting crews are currently getting underway with planting of another six riparian and wetland restoration sites.

Our Tinaku employee, Tom Hilston, is taking responsibility for planting another

health, they also work to increase native biodiversity in the local area. Some of the individual sites are small in scale, but it is the collective impact of native riparian planting and good management practices across multiple farms that will make a difference to Ellesmere's waterways in the longer term. Plans are taking shape for a couple more planting projects this spring. Once the busy June/July period is over, Johanna will be contacting ESAI members who have already expressed interest in having planting done along their waterways to arrange a time for site visits.

The groups gathered at Lakeside Soldiers Memorial Hall to showcase and present on each of their projects to a group of interested parties gathered. Ellesmere Sustainable Agriculture were invited to join in along with Pest Free Banks Peninsula, the Department of Conservation Weed Strike Force and Te Taumutu and Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu Muriwai o Whata Management Plan for Coopers Lagoon.

Irwell River Mouth Project

Brittany Smith who joined the Tinaku team in March is a Spatial Design Graduate specialising in environmental and ecological design. Brittany has been working on a draft concept plan investigating the possibility of enhancing the Irwell River Mouth to allow better public access which incorporates walkways, seating & recreation areas, information boards, boardwalks and spaces for interactive learning and historical information of the site. Brittany presented her plan to the ESAI Governance Group in the May meeting of the ESAI governors and it was well received, the next steps will involve further engagement with adjacent landowners, Te Taumatu Rūnanga and Department of Conservation and exploring funding opportunities and more detailed designs for structures.

Students get hands-on with their learning

Three van loads of Year 10 Ellesmere College students recently visited Tim Chamberlain's Harts Creek Farm to learn about soil health, the role of riparian planting, and to test several samples of Birdlings Brook and Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere water for nitrate.

After a brief introduction to the farm from Tim, Reagan from Soil Matters spoke about the importance of soil health for plant growth and nutritional food quality. While talking, he gave the students spades to dig soil samples with and had them report on the worms and other living creatures they found in the soil. Johanna Blakely from the Tinaku Project spoke about riparian planting, demonstrating the need for correct plant spacing and the implications that this has on a project's cost.

To round up the day, Liz Reid also from the Tinaku Project talked about nitrate in the lowland waterways and had the students test water samples from the area.

The field trip was run as part of an MPI Secondary Schools Employer Programme project linking local businesses with their schools, to broaden Year 9 and 10 student's perspective of Primary Industry careers, and to link science/maths learning with real world uses. Harts Creek Farm has partnered with Ellesmere College in this programme, with assistance from ESAI's Project Tinaku staff.

ESAI members take to the skies

Survey Results Proving Beneficial

Over 80 ESAI members have now been surveyed, the data that has been gathered is already proving highly valuable, assisting the team when planning workshops, events and work streams as well as providing evidence and statistics when applying for funding and grants.

The survey is also helping to identify members who require assistance in environmental farm planning and those who would like restoration projects carried out on their properties as well as updating contact details.

We are so grateful to all those who have agreed to be surveyed. Anonymised data and key information from the survey will be presented at the

AGM on Monday 8th August at Lakeside Hall.

Students complete chainsaw course

The second day of the chainsaw course took place in May at Harts Creek Farm with Bill Haley of Land Based Training.

All attendees completed the work required to gain unit standard 29297 to operate and maintain a chainsaw in a land-based context.

This qualification is very useful, especially for the Gateway Students who attended and can now use these skills when applying for roles in the rural sector.

Many thanks to Tim Chamberlain and Adam Garriock for the use of their workshop and venue.

Later in May, ESAI also offered a second Growsafe and Certified Handler course for the safe handling and use of agrichemicals, an essential requirement for many farmers operating in the area.

Water Quality monitoring update

The Tinaku Project team have now received the report on data from the first year of monthly water quality monitoring conducted by Pattle Delamore Partners on Harts Creek, Boggy Creek and Jollies Brook.

PDP have been testing for various elements including nitrates, sedimentation, macro-invertebrate and macrophytes at 10 sites.

This data, along with two permanent ground-water monitoring stations that have now been installed in the area, will help the project track changes in water quality over time and help to highlight any problems or issues.
